John Kirk (1881-1959)

John Kirk, a son of the Church of Scotland Manse from Edinburgh, was a deeply religious man who spent 20 years working in South China where he was influential in establishing formal medical education. He had been part of a small group of doctors who obtained funding from the Rockefeller Foundation, an initiative that resulted in the founding of three new University Medical Schools in China. He was placed in charge of the new Department of Anatomy in the Canton

Medical School. He excelled as a teacher of anatomy and on his return to the United Kingdom he became Professor of Anatomy at the Middlesex Hospital Medical School... A tall man with natural dignity and courtesy John Kirk was motivated throughout his life by a deep religious conviction.
